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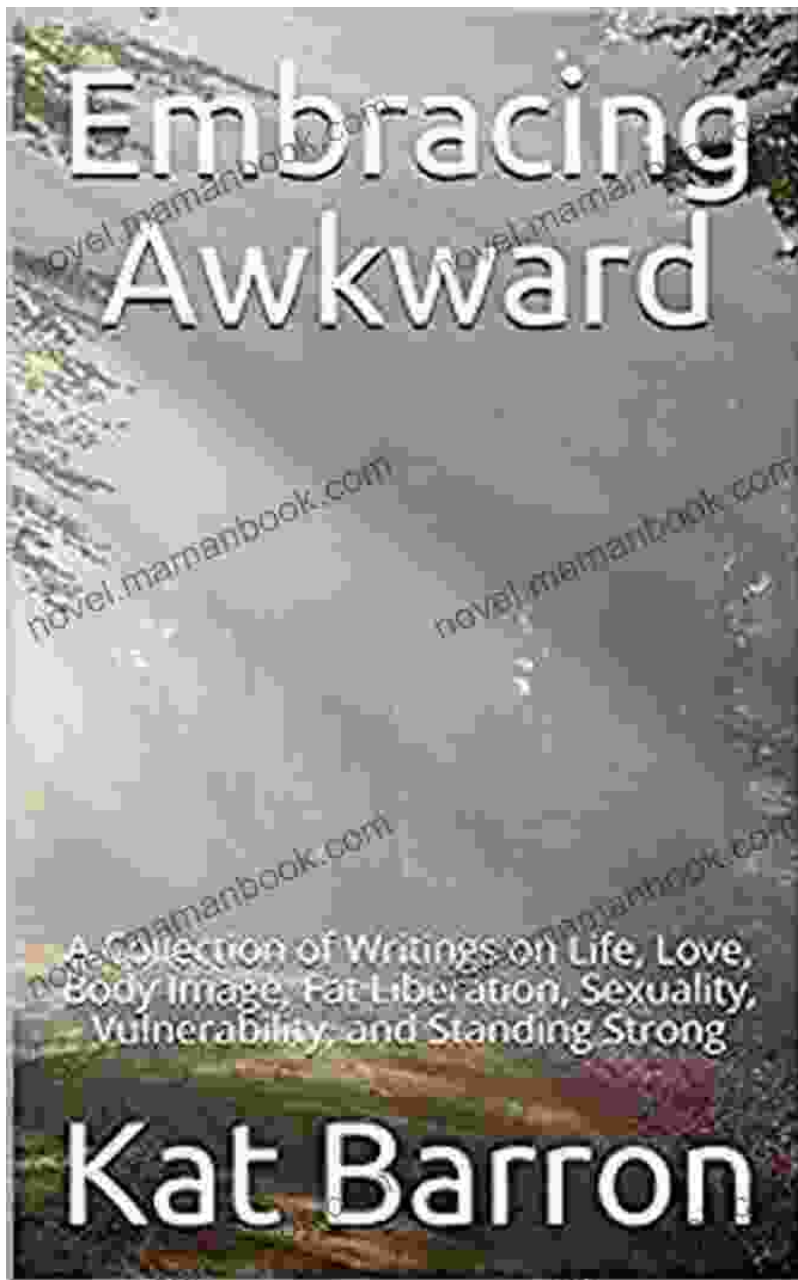


Nakedness: Vulnerability, Innocence, and Rebirth

Finite Set

Example

A is the set of natural numbers less than 6

$A = \{1, 2, 3, 4, 5\}$

Since, set A has 5 elements. So, elements can be counted.

Thus, set A is finite set.

Infinite Set

Number elements cannot be counted i.e. if elements are infinite

Example

B = Set of all natural numbers

$B = \{1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, \dots\}$

Since we cannot count all the natural numbers,

Thus, Set B is infinite set.

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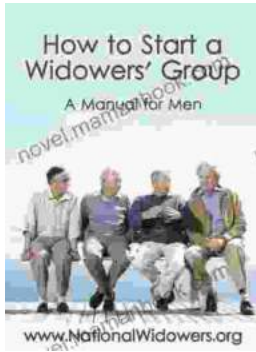
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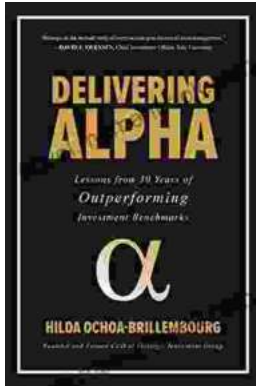
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
